He speaks in a soft and measured voice, takes care of the crew members, and keeps an omnipresent eye on the wellbeing of the spacecraft to make sure everything is a-ok. WALL-E in Wall-E

The Waste Allocation Load Lifter – Earth-Class, aka Wall-E, is, by far, the cutest robot on this list and, in spite of his relatively recent introduction, one of the most beloved Pixar characters of all time.



Left on a future version of planet Earth, where trash has submerged cities and the pollution has gone up beyond livability, Wall-E spent centuries cleaning the environment. Over time, as he watched his fellow trash-recycling mates gradually falling into oblivion, Wall-E started developing emotions — curiosity and loneliness among others — that had him befriend a cockroach named Hal (Got it?), wonder about the vastness of the universe above him and, eventually, fall in love with the beautifully-shaped, LED-eyed EVE.

OPTIMUS PRIME in Transformers

Toy, transforming truck, self-righteous leader and an excuse for Michael Bay to throw massive explosions at random – these are only some of Optimus Prime's titles. Head of the Autobots, the good guys in the *Transformers* franchise, Optimus has been entertaining the public for over 30 years now, always finding new ways to engage

in massive robot fights that usually result in entire cities being levelled, with close to no human casualties.
